RC46 can look forward to a very exciting program at the XX ISA World Congress in Melbourne. The full draft program reflecting the accepted papers for the 17 sessions we are hosting (excluding the business meeting) appears below. On 2 December Confex notified all presenters that their papers have been accepted. Between December 15 and January 15, Confex schedules Joint Sessions, Roundtables, and Poster sessions. Between January 16 and January 26, I will be responsible for scheduling the regular sessions.

The rest of the deadlines are as follows:

January 31, 2023 24:00 GMT

Applications for Registration Grants: Program Coordinators receive applications for ISA grants submitted by the participants by this deadline.

February 15, 2023 24:00 GMT

• **Submission of proposed Registration Grants recipients:** Program Coordinators send a list of selected individuals and amounts recommended to the ISA <u>Secretariatisa@isa-sociology.orgfor</u> verification and approval.

March 22, 2023 24:00 GMT

• **Registration deadline for presenters:** Registration must be paid by the deadline. Confex matches registrations with accepted presenters and will send out a last reminder to register. Presenters who have failed to register will be automatically deleted from the program.

April 3 - 18, 2023 24:00 GMT

• Session Organizers modify sessions based on withdrawal of non-registered presenters.• Chairs and discussants are assigned from among the registered participants.• Program Coordinators complete session schedule according to the conference timetable.• In case the type of an individual presentation is changed, or if a presentation is transferred to a different session, Confex will send notifications to authors with final session and presentation details.

Call for Submissions to the Clinical Sociology Review By Jan Fritz

The *Clinical Sociology Review* welcomes accessible and engaging contributions that will help us examine, reduce, and resolve problems at all intervention levels, from individual through global.

The Clinical Sociology Review (CSR) was the official journal of the Clinical Sociology
Association. It first was published in 1982 and the final issue, Volume 16, was published in 1998. The 16 volumes are all available on Wayne State University's website at https://digitalcommons.wayne.edu/csr/ The new CSR is being published by UJ Press and will be available at https://journals.uj.ac.za/index.php/csr

The CSR is being relaunched this month, beginning with Volume 17, as an open-access journal by the Department of Sociology at the University of Johannesburg and the Clinical Sociology division (RC46) of the International Sociological Association. Collaborating organizations in this effort are the Association for Applied and Clinical Sociology (United States), Nodo Sur- América Latina – RISC (Uruguay), Réseau International de Sociologie Clinique - RISC (Paris, France), Sociologie Clinique (CR19) of the Association Internationale des Sociologues de Langue Française (AISLF) and Sociologie clinique (RT16) of the Association Française de Sociologie (AFS)

The new *Clinical Sociology Review* is a peer-reviewed and open-access journal that publishes contributions in English, French and Spanish. The author submits in one of the three languages and translation of a contribution in the other two languages will be available on the website. There is no fee for submission or publication.

Contributions are welcome to the journal's three sections: *The History of Clinical Sociology, Articles* and *Resources*. The *History* section contains articles about the history of the field as well as introductory pieces to historic publications by clinical sociologists. The *Articles* section contains short and long submissions such as research articles; essays; discussions of teaching or training; and discussions of intervention work. The *Resources* section contains reviews of one or more films or books as well as invited pieces about clinical sociology membership organizations or services (such as program accreditation or individual certification as a clinical sociologist).

APSA CONFERENCE 2022 with ISA RC 46 and ISA RC 15

The Asia Pacific Sociological Association (APSA), in collaboration with Chulalongkorn University, held a 2-day simultaneous conference hybrid mode—both online and onsite—on October 28-29, 2022, with the theme "Reimagining Development Futures in the Age of the Anthropocene and the Climate Crisis" at Jumpot-Pantip Conference Room, Prajadhipok Building, and Social Innovation Hub. At the proceedings, keynote speakers delivered their speeches, namely Dr. Armida Salsia Alisjahbana, executive secretary of the United Nations for Asia and the Pacific, Dr. Cynthai Maung, Founder of Mae Tao Clinic and a Magsaysay Awardee for Community Leadership, Honorable Ma. Antonia Yulo Loyzaga, Secretary of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources in the Philippines, and Dr. Bhichit Rattakul, a former BMA Governor and Secretary General of the Asian Disaster Preparedness Center.

The conference had two days of plenary sessions. The first session focused on Uneven Development, inequality, Climate Vulnerability, and Poverty—Current



and Future Trajectories, and Voices of Vulnerable and Marginalized Groups: Key Messages and Statements from the 17-18 October Voice Forum. On the second day, the BMA and Asia Pacific-Climate Crisis, regional collaboration agenda and directions, and Setting the Scene-Connecting Professor Mushakoji Kinhide's Legacy: Developing Futures, Climate Crisis, and Ecological Peace in the Anthropocene were also discussed. Also, parallel sessions of accepted papers were held alongside the plenary at the conference. Finally, the conference was successfully attended by scholars, educators, and government official. *For APSA statement see it* here

Meanwhile, several books in French were released lately by French and Belgian clinical sociologists, showing the diversity of the areas studied by our approach: - Delphine Vincenot published a book on the modernization of NGOs based on the work she conducted for her PhD. thesis (« La crise de modernisation des organisations associatives »): view here - Isabelle Seret published the first novel with a clinical sociologist as the main character, in order to shed light on domestic violence (« Chez moi vit la violence»): view here - Julien Cueille published a book on subjectivation through fiction, considering mangas and the culture of teenagers (« Mangas, sagas, séries, les nouveaux mythes adolescents »): view here - Agnès Vandevelde-Rougale published a book inviting to question what's behind managerial discourse and thus to retrieve the ability to accept or refuse to abide by power discourses (view here) Our colleague from Argentina, Ana Correa, also selected and translated into Spanish several texts from Eugène Enriquez (« Análisis e intervención en procesos relacionales e institucionales »): view here. We are also pleased to mention that our colleague, Marie-Anne Dujarier received a distinction for her book on « work trouble » (« Troubles dans le travail »): view here. Several seminars and trainings can also be stressed : The seminar « life stories and theoretical choices » organised by the LCSP (Université Paris Cité) and the RISC continues in 2022-2023 (view here), the classes for master students in clinical sociology recently started (view here), and courses are also organized as part of vocational training (see for instance for training in France: view here.

The international cooperation continues, with actions and events gathering clinical sociologists from various parts of the world, for instance French and Canadian clinical sociologists (view here). Many thanks to Fernando de Yzaguirre for his work in promoting clinical sociology in Spanish, both in Spain and in South America (see for instance view here). We can also mention that Agnès Vandevelde-Rougale, from France, and Patricia Guerrero Morales, from Chile, contributed with a joint chapter to an international book on « Violence and discrimination in research organizations », to be released in December 2022 in open access (Chapter 9 in: view here).

Clinical Sociology at the National University of Colombia

The first, and most important, Department of Sociology in Colombia was founded at the National University (Bogotá) in 1959 7. One of its main promoters was Orlando Fals-Borda 8, who ardently defended a "committed science" and was one of the main promoters of Participatory Action Research (IAP), close in its epistemology to Clinical Sociology. The Department of Sociology of the National University has organized a conference by Fernando de Yzaguirre, professor of Sociology at the Universidad del Atlántico, and representative for Colombia of the RISC 9 and the RC46 (ISA) 10. Professor Yzaguirre is co-director of the collection of clinical sociology in Spanish, of the publisher Sapere Aude 11, which in 2022 published his most important reference work: the Dictionary of Clinical Sociology 12, with 131 authors and 245 articles. The conference is entitled "The Clinical Approach in Social Sciences. A Bridge between Theoretical and Applied Sociology: Clinical Sociology" and has aroused great interest since it is part of the re-launch of the Masters in Sociology at the National University.

The introduction of Clinical Sociology in Colombia has been carried out from the Universidad del Atlántico, where it has been present since 2015, when the subject "Clinical Sociology of Organisations" and the Research Seedbed in "Clinical Sociology and Psychosociological Intervention, SOCLIP" were created. Currently, the Universidad del Atlántico offers within its Extension program the "FEDERICO RUBIO Y GALI Clinical Sociology Virtual Classroom", in which five countries participate: Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia and Spain. The conference will take place on Tuesday, September 27, 2022, in the Postgraduate Building of the Faculty of Human Sciences of the National University, on the campus of the city of Bogotá.
