Now in 11 languages, it contains articles on global inequality, social protest in Europe, migrants in Malaysia, the hegemony of English, reports from conferences in Brazil and Canada, accounts of sociology in Romania and Peru, women's movements in the Caucasus, education in South Africa, moving tributes to former ISA President Ulf Himmelstrand, and the changing status of women in the ISA.

This issue initiates the Executive Committee's second year in office. It contains articles on the unfolding of events in Egypt, Latin American sociology, Polish migrants in Germany, the continuing debate about global sociology, reports from 8 other countries, obituaries of John Rex and Kurt Jonassohn, criticism of ISA election rules, and much else.

In other news, the ISA Forum in Buenos Aires looks like being one of the best attended events in ISA history, sure to be a memorable tangling of ideas and practices. In preparation for the theme – social justice and democratization – I've been running a

Just two weeks ago the ISA held a highly successful meeting of National Associations at the Middle-East Technical University in Ankara, Turkey. Nearly 50 countries were represented. We learned how similar and yet how different sociology can be around the globe. We learned much from our Turkish colleagues, not just about sociology and politics but also their dancing. We left as the protest movement against the AKP government was just beginning. As I write now it looks like the continuation of the Arab Spring on new territory. Some have traced the Arab Spring to Iran's Green Movement of 2009, which is analyzed in the latest issue of *Global Dialogue* along with an account of the Arab Winter in Egypt – the violence of counter-revolution. We continue our series on "sociology as vocation" with the visions of Raewyn Connell and Randolf David. You will also find accounts of the way universities are operating today as profit centers in India and how brave German sociologists have bucked their ranking system, how violence is normalized in Mexico. As you can see from the clickable contents below, there's plenty to chew on in GD3.3, now appearing in 15 languages, the latest being Ukrainian.

And don't forget abstracts for the Congress are due by the end of this month, September 30, 2013.

Last but not least September 14th is the last date to send in votes for or against the restructuring of the ISA. Dear Colleagues:

This is my last letter as President of the ISA. It has been an honor and privilege to serve as your President. These last four years have been both interesting and challenging. They culminate in the XVIII World Congress of Sociology in Yokohama, Japan. There will be a record attendance of some 6,000 sociologists, ready to discuss the theme: "Facing an Unequal World: Challenges for Sociology" – an issue that has become ever more salient, both in sociology and in the public eye. Many have made important contributions to the success of the Congress, but I would like to make special mention of the Japanese Local Organizing Committee, headed by Koichi Hasegawa; the Program Committee headed by Raquel Sosa; and the ISA Secretariat in Madrid, headed by Izabela Barlinska.

With this letter you will also find the <u>latest issue of *Global Dialogue*</u> (GD4.2) that examines the theme of the Congress with essays on sociology as a vocation from Dorothy Smith and Herb Gans, an interview with Peruvian sociologist-politician Nicolás Lynch. We have articles from Latin America on the coloniality of power and on the 20th anniversary of the uprising in Chiapas; and from the Middle East on life in Syrian prisons and the ambiguous progress of Iranian women. We have two articles from the heart of the Ukrainian Maidan; two articles on the politics of climate change; three articles on land expropriation in China; a Polish retrospective on former ISA President, Jan Szczepański, as well as articles on reform of higher education in Poland. At the moment GD4.2 is available in 10 languages but 4 more will be arriving soon.
