

Abstracts must be submitted in English, French or Spanish. Only abstracts submitted on-line will be considered in the selection process.</p>
<p>October 7 – November 4, 2019 24:00 GMT</p>	<p>Abstracts selection: Session Organizer must complete selection of abstracts and provide a final presentation designation (oral, distributed, poster, round table). Session Organizers move good quality abstracts unsuited for their sessions to the Program Coordinator’s bin for transfer to another session.</p> <p>Note: abstracts transfers should be done to the Program Coordinator’s bin as early as possible so that good abstracts may be transferred to other appropriate sessions to enable organizers to consider these transferred abstracts and make decisions within the deadlines.</p> <p>Session Organizers add chairs, co-chairs, discussants, panellists to their sessions as needed.</p>

2020 ISA Forum: Additional sessions for large RCs

Dear colleagues,

I am preparing a new “VP Research letter” with a series of important decisions that have been taken at the ISA Executive Committee meeting that took place in Manila earlier this month. In the meanwhile, I would like to inform you of the EC decision to provide additional sessions to the large RCs, which are the ones under the strongest pressure in the panel section process.

On the suggestion of the Research Coordination Committee and the VP Research, the Executive Committee has thus decided to allocate

- 4 extra-sessions for the RCs with over 200 members, i.e. 24 or 22 sessions in total. The number of sessions above 20 will be “parallel sessions” held during the RC timeslots in a different room.
- RC between 150 and 200 members will have 3 additional sessions, i.e. 19 sessions.
- RC between 100 and 150 members will get 2 additional sessions, i.e. 16 sessions.
- Two additional sessions have been allocated to RC29 “Deviance and social control” to accommodate sessions proposed by a TG project that has not been approved by the RCC.

Program coordinators may use these additional sessions in two ways. They may either select two additional panel proposals, or keep the possibility to allocate (in October) two panels to two of the selected panels that receive a very high number of abstract proposals.

I know that these additional sessions will not solve the headache of choosing between many excellent proposals. It should however open some new possibilities.

I am also aware that the selection process is sometimes very difficult for smaller RCs. The reason why these additional sessions have been allocated to larger RCs goes however beyond the incentive to increase your RC membership. It seeks to reduce a gap that was unfair in the previous rules. While the RCs with less than 100 members are granted on average 1 session for each 7 members in good standings, this rate was 13 members per session for the RCs with more than 200 members. The additional sessions reduces this gap.

I would like to invite the RCs who have been granted these two additional sessions (and the others) to improve the participation of researchers from lower income countries (“B&C countries”) and from early career sociologists, as these were two of the main requests expressed by RC presidents and a major preoccupation for the ISA Executive Committee.

Please consult regularly the ISA guidelines for Program Coordinators that contain useful advices for every step of the process.
