Previously an invite-only platform, Bluesky was opened to all users in early 2024. Since last month's presidential election in the US, millions of social media users have switched to Bluesky, which has become the social media platform of choice for many. Arguments abound over whether progressive researchers, academics and students ought to abandon Twitter/X entirely. While we are cognisant of X/Twitter's ongoing deterioration and open to considered and constructive suggestions, RC44 is maintaining our presence on Twitter/X for the time being. However, we emphasise that we do have a Bluesky account, so please follow us <u>@labourrc44.bsky.social</u> and encourage friends, colleagues and comrades in labour scholarship and the labour movement to do the same!! In addition, we have a recently established <u>LinkedIn page</u> and we maintain a presence on <u>Facebook</u> (which we will look to update ASAP).
