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Message from the RC48 President



Dear RC48 colleagues and friends,

As we look forward to the pivotal 5th ISA Forum of Sociology in Rabat in July 2025, it is my pleasure to extend a warm greeting and share some reflections on our collective journey, challenges, and aspirations.

RC48 has continued to thrive as a vibrant intellectual and activist community. We now count 234 members, all ISA-affiliated, representing a truly global network. From the United States and India to Japan, South Africa, Colombia, and beyond, our committee's strength lies in this diversity of perspectives and geographies. This global footprint enriches our collective work and allows us to foster dialogues that transcend disciplinary and national boundaries.

Over the past months, our committee has been actively involved in fostering research, organising events, and supporting emerging scholars. A central milestone was the 4th RC48 PhD Workshop, held in Catania, Italy, in September 2024. This workshop offered a unique, supportive space for doctoral students to present their projects, receive feedback, and build lasting academic relationships. These encounters reaffirm our commitment to mentoring the next generation of social movement scholars and promoting epistemic inclusivity within and beyond academia.

We have also launched the RC48 Global Online Conversations 2024–25, an initiative that has brought together scholars and activists from across the world to engage in urgent debates around digital extremism, temporality, solidarity, and migration. These conversations continue to reflect our shared belief in the political and methodological value of bridging academic knowledge with activist praxis, especially during times of global turmoil.

Another significant achievement has been the co-organisation of the International Conference on Cultural Backlash, Digital Extremism, and Transnational Networks, held in Bilbao, Spain, in January 2025. This gathering not only deepened our understanding of the far-right's rise but also launched the New Far Rights Global Research Network, a timely and necessary initiative that RC48 is proud to support.

Looking ahead, we are especially excited about our RC48 Summer School Retreat: "Social Movements and Sociologies of the Future", to be held in Montebello, Quebec, in September 2025. This retreat promises to offer a dynamic and experimental space for early-career researchers to explore the critical and transformative potential of social movements, with a focus on participatory methods, transnational dialogues, and future-oriented sociologies.

It was founded as a Working Group in 1992, under the presidency of Prof. Bert Klandermans. In 1994, it was recognised as an ISA Research Committee.

The objective of RC48 is to foster intellectual, academic and scholarly exchanges between researchers of broadly defined social movements, collective action and social change. The RC48 is currently based at the Collective Identity Research Centre (Department of Sociology 2, University of the Basque Country, Spain).

The ISA was founded in 1949 under the auspices of UNESCO. With more than 5,000 members coming from 167 countries, the ISA is currently the most important international professional association in the field of sociology. Its goal is to advance sociological knowledge throughout the world and to represent sociologists everywhere, regardless of their school of thought, scientific approaches or ideological opinion.

The ongoing scientific activities of the ISA are decentralised into 55 Research Committees (RC), 3 Working Groups (WG) and 5 Thematic Groups (TG), each dealing with a well-recognised speciality in sociology. These groups bring together scholars who wish to pursue comparative research on a transnational basis and they constitute basic networks of scientific research, intellectual debate and professional Although they must fulfil exchange. certain minimum requirements, RCs have complete autonomy to operate. Each RC's governing body is the Board, formed by a President, a Secretary, and a variable number of board members. RC48 participates in the organisation of both the ISA World Congresses, celebrated every 4 years since 1950 (Zurich), and the ISA Forums of Sociology, also celebrated every 4 years since 2008 (Barcelona).

About RC48

In contrast to the ISA World Congress, which has a more professional and academic character, the forum's original purpose was to establish an open dialogue with colleagues doing sociology in public institutions, social movements, and civil society organisations. This means that every two years, we are involved in the organisation of a worldwide event. In between ISA World Congresses and forums, our committee organises smaller scientific meetings called RC48 international conferences. These meetings tend to be more narrowly focused than other ISA events and, on average, they gather between 30 and 60 scholars. Consequently, colleagues can make longer presentations, and we can hold deeper and more enriching debates.

Presentation

The International Sociological Association (ISA) Research Committee on Social Movements, Collective Action, and Social Change (RC48) is delighted to announce its upcoming summer school retreat, themed 'Social Movements and Sociologies of the Future'. This interdisciplinary event will take place from **September 9 to 11, 2025**, in **Montebello, Quebec, Canada**. It will serve as a platform and forum for scholars, researchers, and activists to engage in critical discussions on the evolving dynamics of social movements and their potential to shape sociological theory and praxis in a rapidly changing world.

The 21st century is characterised by interconnected crises (climate change, rising authoritarianism, the ascendance of the far-right, systemic inequality, criminalisation and persecution of migrants, political repression, and global health emergencies, to name a few) that demand innovative and disruptive responses. Social movements are at the forefront of these transformations, challenging existing power structures and imagining alternative futures.

For this reason, this RC48 summer school retreat aims to deepen our understanding of social movements, activists and grassroots initiatives by exploring questions such as: How are social movements prefiguring alternative futures in the face of global challenges? What new forms of collective action and solidarity are emerging in response to intersecting crises? How can sociological theories and methods better engage with the transformative potential of social movements? By addressing these and related questions, this summer school seeks to foster critical dialogues and conversations on the intersections between social movements, collective action, and sociologies of the future, with a focus on diverse regional and theoretical/epistemological perspectives.

This RC48 summer school retreat will be facilitated by academics, activists and members of Canadian grassroots organisations. **It would be a maximum of 15 participants**, to guarantee the quality of this academic experience.

Call for papers and presentations

The RC48 Summer School retreat invites submissions that align with the theme of 'Social Movements and Sociologies of the Future'. Suggested topics for papers and presentations include but are not limited to:

- The role of social movements in constructing alternative futures
- Grassroots approaches to authoritarianism, marginalisation, racism and structural violence
- The impact of digital technologies and AI on mobilisation and resistance
- Transnational social movements addressing climate justice, migration, and global inequalities
- Methodological innovations in studying with and about social movements, including participatory action research, creative cartographies, and technological-based approaches
- The temporalities of change, including social movement cycles and long-term strategies.

Submissions are encouraged from PhD students and early-career researchers. Each submission should include a **350-word abstract** outlining the research topic, methodology, and relevance to the summer school retreat theme, as well as a short bio of no more than 150 words detailing the author's academic background and areas of expertise.

Please submit your application to c.a.tamayogomez@hud.ac.uk. The deadline for submissions is **Thursday, May 15, 2025**, with notifications of acceptance to be sent out by **Monday, June 02, 2025**.

Participants in the summer school will have the opportunity to engage with leading scholars, activists, and peers in the field of social movements, present and receive feedback on their research projects, and explore interdisciplinary and global perspectives on the future of social movements. In addition, interactive workshops and collaborative sessions will foster new ideas and networks. Set against the scenic backdrop of Montebello, Quebec, in a quiet forest on the outskirts of the town, the event promises to be both intellectually enriching and personally inspiring.

The Research Committee on Social Movements, Collective Action, and Social Change (RC48) will cover the participants' fees and meals during the three days. Accommodation will be provided free of charge in shared facilities or campsites at the residence.

We warmly invite you to submit your papers or presentations and join us in Montebello to co-create the future of sociology through the lens of social movements. Conversation with Dr. Lesley Wood: Temporality and Movement Strategy (28 November 2024)

Notes by Eloy Rivas-Sanchez:

In this session of the series, Professor Lesley Wood examined the interplay between temporality and social movement strategy, situating her analysis in the current moment of global turmoil. With November 2024 as a backdrop—marked by the election of Trump in the United States, the ascendency of right-wing agenda as well as the rising migrant justice movements, Palestine solidarity efforts, and counter-movements worldwide—Professor Wood asked: How do we understand the power of movements, and why do some movements become strategic and impactful despite overwhelming odds? In answering those questions, the argument that she developed through this talk was that paying closer attention to the dimensions of time—conceptions, perceptions, and practices—provides a crucial lens for understanding movement success and failure. It also argues that

paying attention to the role that time and temporality plan on social movements relevant to scholars and activists alike.

Lesley Wood began this talk/conversation by breaking down temporality into three key components:

- Temporal Conceptions: Which refers to how movements orient themselves to the past, present, and future, including their temporal horizons and norms around the pace of action.
- Temporal Perceptions: Which refers to how movements perceive time, including the pace of change, generational shifts, and moments of acceleration.
- Temporal Practices: How movements operationalize time through tactics, communication, and organizational structures, such as calendars and decision-making processes.

Drawing on historical examples like the Gordon Riots of 1780 and the Cold Bath Fields Riots of 1833, Wood's presentation illustrated how shifts in temporal logic—from cyclical to linear time, and from preserving the past to reforming the future—have shaped the development of social movements. She asserted that the dominant model of social movements, rooted in the work of her mentor Charles Tilly, is still relevant, in fact fundamental, for understanding the role that time and temporality play in social movement strategy and social transformation. This is so, she argued, because it is through a historical approach to social movements, an approach that pays serious attention to time and temporality, that social movements scholars can go beyond dominant assumptions that assume time as linear and universal. notion that reproduced a and state-centric notion of time ans social change. This is so because such assumptions, Wood argued, limit both academic analysis and activist strategy by constraining how movements imagine and enact change.

Wood's talk then turned to theorize contemporary social movements, such as the Black Lives Matter (BLM) and the Solidarity with Palestine movement in Toronto. In using those

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examples, Wood showed how activists perceive and employ temporal narratives and tactics to challenge power structures. By linking past injustices to present struggles and future possibilities, movements like BLM and the Palestine Solidarity movement (PSM) expand the temporal horizon of justice, creating cracks or moments of crisis that disrupt the status quo. Wood also highlighted the importance of recognizing waves and cycles of protest, as well as eventful moments, which tend to create momentum, unique temporal opportunities for transformative action.

The last part of the event featured a conversation between Professor Lesley Wood and Eloy Rivas-Sánchez, the convenor of this talk, alongside numerous movement scholars affiliated with the ISA RC34 Research Committee. Participants engaged with the discussion through asking questions and by theorizing social movements and temporality in light of historical contemporary social struggles worldwide. Examples included Migrant Justice Activisms in Canada and the United States, peasants revolts in India, the Zapatistas in Mexico, and others. Professor Wood engaged with those guestions thoroughly and concluded with a call to social movement scholars to reimagine the role of time and temporality in the study of social movements. By engaging in the reflection and understanding of diverse temporalities. Professor Wood asserted. scholars movements can enhance their capacity and challenge dominant power structures more effectively. This is so because adopting temporal lenses have the potential to not only enrich our academic understanding of social movements but also to offer practical tools for activists seeking to build a more just world.

Registration fees vary depending on your membership status with the International Sociological Association, your country of residence, and your membership category (Regular, Student, or Life Member). Non-member students are eligible for a special registration fee. To apply for this status, you must submit your application through your ISA account attaching your proving documentation.

ISA Statement regarding concerns from LGBTQIA+ members about the 5th ISA Forum of Sociology in Rabat, Morocco, July 6-11, 2025

Some ISA members have expressed concerns regarding the selection of Morocco for the location of our 2025 ISA Forum.

based on the country's historical record of policies concerning LGBTQIA+ groups. The ISA takes LGBTQIA+ issues, and human rights in general, very seriously, and we highly value the contributions of our association's LGBTQIA+ members.

The ISA Executive Committee discussed at length the selection of Morocco for the 2025 Forum. After extensive research and discussion with the Local Organizing Committee, we based our decision on two key criteria: (1) we are confident in our ability to ensure the safety and security of LGBTQIA+ Forum attendees while at the conference; and (2) we consider this a valuable opportunity for the ISA to be a contributor to what is currently an active and constructive global debate on sexual freedoms and politics. The 2025 ISA Forum will join a series of large international events held in Morocco, which reflect the country's dynamic role in hosting diverse international events dealing with global issues ranging from climate change, global policies, and development to health, sports, and migration. These events attest to Morocco's capacity to host and welcome people from diverse backgrounds.

In what follows, we provide more detailed information on Morocco's progress in supporting LGBTQIA+ rights and related concerns.

Moroccan authorities have taken a series of positive steps to advance their commitment to human rights, including the 2011 adoption of a new Constitution that enshrines human rights. Morocco has also ratified the United Nations (UN) nine core human rights treaties and gives individuals in its jurisdiction access to five UN Treaty Bodies: the Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination (CERD), the Committee against Torture (CAT), the Committee on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD), the Human Rights Committee, and the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW) (as of April 2023).

These steps place the country among those with the best

record in the Middle East and North African (MENA) region in terms of human rights, and further steps have been taken as well. For example, a Regulator of Equality and the Fight against all Forms of Discrimination has been established, and a draft law establishing the Authority for Parity and the Fight against all Forms of Discrimination (APALD) has been prepared.

The criminalization of physical acts of homosexuality remains part of the Moroccan Criminal Code, as in many countries with French and British colonial legacies. Therefore, we would like to describe the nature of these laws. First, the Moroccan Criminal Code does not criminalize LGBTQIA+ identity, nor expressing, displaying, or acknowledging these identities. Criminal Code limits itself to criminalizing physical "acts of homosexuality" between two people of the same born gender. Second, Article 489 of the Moroccan Penal Code, which was originally written by the French colonial administration, stipulates that "anyone who commits an act of homosexuality with a person of the same gender shall be punished by imprisonment from six months to three years and a fine of MAD 200 (about USD 20) to MAD 2,000 (about USD 200)."

The fact that this colonial penal code article remains in the books has become a target of active resistance in Moroccan civil society. Several associations and social movements in Morocco are currently demanding reforms and the abolition of Article 489. Activists and the National Human Rights Council (the official Moroccan state body) are advocating for the decriminalization of consensual same-sex sexual relations. Moreover, during the Universal Periodic Review celebrated in recent years by the UN Human Rights Council, Morocco announced its acceptance of international recommendations to enhance the protection of LGBTQIA+ rights. Despite these advances and a general tolerance of LGBTQIA+ identities in Moroccan society, we do recognize that mainstream society remains conservative.

Homophobia is a global issue. Gains in civil and legal rights have not always been accompanied by respect toward those

individuals who express these identities. Indeed, many countries with progressive legislation are seeing a rise in anti-LGBTQIA+ violence and overtly LGBTQIA+-phobic political parties. These dynamics demonstrate the tensions and complexities involved in promoting diversity in gender identities and protecting human rights, which are at the heart of the issues of justice and knowledge that we will be discussing at the 5th ISA Forum in Morocco. At the ISA, we firmly believe that it is precisely our community that takes these issues seriously, both in our scientific work and in our engagement with social movements, and that we must not shy away from discussing these topics in countries where these issues may be contentious. The discussions we are engaged in and the support that we are receiving from the Local Organizing Committee have convinced us that we are at a pivotal moment in Moroccan history where there is a clear recognition of the need not only to discuss these issues but also to give the social sciences a greater voice in scientific debate and public policy.

As we prepare for this important event, the ISA will ensure that information and assistance are provided to all Forum attendees about how to navigate the myriad intersectionalities of identity when travelling to and being in Morocco. Our intention is for this Forum of Sociology to be a truly inclusive event. In this spirit of inclusivity and mutual respect that we practice when visiting any country around the world, we encourage all participants to learn about, engage with, and respect the people and laws of our host country during our Forum. Embracing this respectful approach will enrich our collective experience and foster a more meaningful and harmonious global dialogue.



The "City of Lights", a modern capital with a rich history

Rabat is Morocco's capital, located on the northwest coast and home to around 2 million people in its metropolitan area. Influenced by the Maamora forest and urban green spaces called the green belt, the city has a favorable climate. Founded in the 12th century as a fortified camp named "Ribat" ("fortification" in Arabic), it has grown into a vibrant city it is today. 




