Urgent! Support GLJ's inclusion in WOS ranking

We reiterate an urgent announcement made in March to sign a petition opposing the exclusion of the journal from rankings by Clarivate. Unfortunately, very few people have signed the petition so far. Please take a couple of minutes to sign and circulate it widely!

Support the ranking of the Global Labour Journal!!

GLJ is currently listed under the Emerging Sources Citation Index (ESCI). Clarivate has stopped upgrading ESCI journals to the WOS main catalogue since the introduction of the Journal Impact Factor (JIF) in 2022. This has prevented GLJ from achieving higher visibility despite a strong JIF corresponding to a Q2 rank.

Published by McMaster University Press, part of the Canadian Research Knowledge Network (CKNW), GLJ is seeking support to urge CKNW to negotiate with Clarivate. We ask you to <u>sign</u> and <u>circulate the petition</u> to help ensure the journal's future.

Call for Junior Editors: Join the GLJ board

GLJ is looking to appoint 2–3 Junior Editors. The journal is fully open access, run by and for labour scholars globally. Its Journal Impact Factor was 1.3 in 2023 (2.2 over five years). Based at McMaster University in Canada, it is the flagship journal of RC44 Labour Movements and the Global Labour University (GLU).

Junior Editors will:

- Join the board and receive mentorship;
- Help manage the publication pipeline and board meetings;
- Copy-edit and prepare journal issues;
- Assist in communications and promotional work.

Positions are voluntary and pro bono, requiring 10–15 hours/month. Applicants should be proficient in English, engaged in labour research, hold at least a Masters degree, have organisational and editing experience. **Applications are due by 15 June 2025** (midnight CET). Apply at this link.
