My Dear Colleagues,

Greetings from New Delhi (National Capital Region)

In the last six months, we have been busy with several academic tasks, particularly giving final shape to the sessions of WG01 for the V ISA Forum of Sociology to be held at Rabat (July 6-11, 2025. have to inform you that we have 17 sessions in the Forum, excluding a session for the Business Meeting on July 8, 2025. The total number of papers to be presented in these sessions is 76. We appreciate the session organizers and authors for their overwhelming response to our call.

We have decided to conduct the Interim Conference of the Working Group in November 2025 in New Delhi. Details of the conference are available in the newsletter as well as on the ISA website. We are expecting a positive response from the members of the WG for their active participation in the conference.

So far, we have 86 active members in the group (66 regular members, 3 life members, and 17 student members). We are making efforts to increase the membership of the WG to more than 100 by December 2025 so that we can claim the status of a research committee soon. This is my appeal to all the active members to make serious efforts for the new regular and student membership among the colleagues and students, so that we can get more sessions in the ISA conferences, as sessions are allotted based on the strength of the membership.

We are now ready with the New Revised Statutes to be adopted after approval in the Business Meeting to be held at Rabat on 8<sup>th</sup> July 2025. I take this opportunity to thank Prof. Parvez Abbasi, who prepared the draft of the new statutes. I am very thankful to Dr. Cecilia Delgado-Molino, Executive Secretary, ISA, for suggestions and comments on the draft of the Statutes.

Finally, I am grateful to Dr. Sarvesh Dutt Tripathi, of the University School of Mass Communication, GGSIP University, New Delhi, India, for preparing and publishing the newsletter of the WG.

Please share reports of your activities with us and information about the activities you are organizing so that we can disseminate information to a wider group.

## Virendra P. Singh, President



Prof. Virendra P. Singh is the Founder and Chairman of Global Research and Educational Foundation India (GREFI). He is an eminent sociologist of international repute. He worked as a faculty in Indian Institute of Mass Communication (IIMC), New Delhi and National Institute of Rural Development (NIRD) Northeastern Regional Centre, Guwahati, India in the initial years of his career and has a vast experience in teaching and research at state and central universities at Bhopal, Silchar, and Allahabad. He has to his credit three books and several research papers in national and international research journals.

Taught Sociology at Barkatullah University, Bhopal, Reader in Sociology, Assam University (Central), Silchar (1996-2005); Professor of Sociology at Assam University, Silchar (2005-2010). He established Centre for Globalization and Development Studies in June 2010 when he was appointed as Founder Head and Professor of Globalization and Development Studies by University of Allahabad, Prayagraj, India and served there over a decade. Prof. Singh actively participates in and organizes sessions within ISA research committees, including RCs-14, 52, and WG-01and served as Board Member of ISA-RC 14 (2014-2018) and ISA-RC 52 (2014-2018). He served as member of Management Committee of Indian Sociological Society (ISS) (2011-2017) and national Convenor of ISS-RC 14 for several years since 2000.

# Parvez A. Abbasi, Vice-President



Parvez A. Abbasi is a former Professor and Head of the Department of Sociology at VNSG University, Surat. He is currently Vice-Chairman of the Global Research and Educational Foundation India (GREFI). He holds a doctoral degree in Social Stratification among Muslims, focusing on the Gaddi Caste in Western Uttar Pradesh. He authored the book "Social Inequality among Indian Muslims" and has published numerous research articles in national and international journals. Prof. Abbasi actively participates in and organizes sessions within ISA research committees,

including RCs-14, 52, and WG-01, and has chaired sessions since the Yokohama World Congress. He served as a board member for ISA RC14 Sociology of Communication, Knowledge, and Culture (2018-23) and is the convener of ISS RC08: Inequalities, Stratification, and Exclusion Studies. He has worked as a Research Officer on UNESCO and ICSSR projects related to Rural-Urban Inter-Relations of Muslims in the Meerut region. Prof. Abbasi is also associated with academic bodies at various Indian universities and has served as a Co-Editor of ISS Hindi Journal Samajshashtra Samiksha. Currently, he is a member of the advisory board for the journals *Emerging Trends in Development Research* and *Navrachna* (Hindi).



# Dimitry Ivanov, Treasurer



Dmitry Ivanov (born 1967) is Professor of Sociology at St. Petersburg State University, Russia. His research interests include current sociological theory, new forms of inequality and new trends of social change – post-globalization and post-virtualization. He is the author of several books published in Russian including Virtualization of Society (2000) and Glam-Capitalism (2008). knowledge and experience to this role.



### Nelly Vuyokazi Sharpley, Member of the Board



Dr. Nelly Sharpley serves as the Acting Director for Special Projects within the Office of the Vice-Chancellor at WSU. In this capacity, her primary focus is on addressing urgent issues, particularly the institution's strategy for combating gender-based violence and sexual abuse. Before her current role, Dr. Sharpley has held several key leadership and strategic positions at WSU, including Head of Social Sciences, where she oversaw 36 staff members and managed five academic programs. She has been an active member of the Senate and served a full term on the WSU council. Her

contributions were instrumental in shaping the approved WSU 2030 strategic goal, and she has also been a valuable member of the WSU commission for Community Engagement and internationalization. Dr. Sharpley's research expertise is evident in her involvement as a lead researcher in the ECSECC/HSRC/WSU COVID-19 and Funeral Protocols project for the Eastern Cape Government. Beyond national boundaries, she represented South Africa at the BRICS Seminar in Russia on population and economic development and played an active role in the BRICS university project. She has a PhD in Sociology from the Institute for Social and Economic Change (ISEC), Bangalore, and her dissertation was awarded the prestigious M.N. Srinivas Memorial Prize for an outstanding PhD thesis at ISEC, India. She is the National Convenor of Research Committee (RC) 14: Globalization and Society of the Indian Sociological Society (ISS) since January 2024. She has actively participated in ISA conferences organized in

India and abroad. She has several publications of international repute and authored a book titled "Mobility among Professionals in Bangalore City". Her area of interest includes Stratification & Mobility Studies; Indian Sociology, Entrepreneurship studies; Globalization & Society, Development Studies, etc.







#### Knowing Justice in the Anthropocene

The 5th ISA Forum of Sociology will take place in Rabat, Morocco on July 6-11, 2025. This is the first ISA Forum to be held in the region and specifically in a country that is known for being at the crossroads of civilizations spanning the Mediterranean, the Middle East and Africa. This unique geographic location, and the campus of Mohammed V University where we will be hosted, is the perfect setting for the intense intellectual debates that are foreseen around the theme "Knowing Justice in the Anthropocene". The dates of the Forum provide us with the opportunity to engage these debates in our Forum and in a sociological film festival that will be open to the public, just before the city will turn its gaze from sociology to football as host of the 2025 Africa Cup of Nations.

The Forum will bring together sociologists from around the world to unpack this complex theme. Our point of departure lies in the recognition of the Anthropocene and the environmental concerns that accompany it. This word entered our lexicon at the turn of the Millennium when geologists first began to identify what they considered to be irreversible geological traces of human societies on the planet. In March 2024, the 'scientists' (according to a *New York Times* reporter) decided that no, we were not really in a new geological epoch. But the journalist noted that the term had already gained so much importance in anthropology and history that it will most likely stay relevant in societies. This situation of contested knowledges is precisely what we will tackle in Rabat.

What does it mean to "know" in the context of the Anthropocene? Whose knowledge counts? What forms of knowing (understood in its feminist and relational sense) are prioritized, and with what consequences, in societal change? While some sub-disciplines have been actively contributing to academic and public debates, sociology writ large has not been at the center of these debates regarding the conditions of living with and in the Anthropocene. How might engaging the sociological imagination in discussions of the Anthropocene better equip sociologists and citizens to contribute to these public debates about our individual and collective capacities to live together in such an epoch?

This brings us to the question of justice. How do we know what is fair and just? Can we forge new understandings of justice for the Anthropocene? What can sociology contribute to how we know justice among knowledges (ontological and epistemic justice) or about aspects of our social worlds, such as environmental justice, legal justice, transitional justice, land justice, water justice, interspecies justice, racial justice, ethnic justice, or gender justice? What new questions are opened about these types of relations when the conditions of the Anthropocene are taken seriously?

This broad theme provides a space for dialogue within and across ISA's 67 Research Committees (RCs), Working Groups (WGs), and Thematic Groups (TGs). We invite all sociologists from all walks of life and all corners of the earth to join us in Rabat in 2025!

# Revised Final Statutes (To be Adopted by Board and in Business Meeting to be held at Morocco on 7th and 8th July 2025)

Following the principles of the Statutes of the International Sociological Association (ISA), these statutes are proposed to be approved by members of the Working Group in good standing of the International Sociological Association.

#### **ARTICLE 1. PURPOSES**

- 1. The purposes of the Working Group, the Sociology of Local-Global Relations, are as follows:
- 1.1 To encourage scientific research and knowledge on the relationships among global, local, and regional groups, associations, and organizations, both governmental and non-governmental.
- 1.2 To establish contacts and to encourage collaboration among scholars working in the field of globalization, local communities, and glocalization of socio-cultural milieu and related issues.
- 1.3 To enhance international cooperation and exchange in theoretical and empirical research in Sociology on Local-Global Relations.
- 1.4 To link theoretical and empirical research in Sociology on Local-Global Relations with any related specialist fields or disciplines.
- 1.5 To act as the international representative body of Sociology on Local-Global Relations.

#### **ARTICLE 2. ACTIVITIES**

- *To achieve these ends, the Working Group shall focus on the following activities:*
- 2.1 To encourage research on Sociology on Local-Global Relations among the members and the international dissemination and exchange of information on the developments in this field.
- 2.2 To organize sessions at meetings of the ISA and interim conferences in different continents between the Forum and World Congress in collaboration with local research bodies, preferably institutional members of ISA.
- 2.3 To provide information on significant developments in the field through means such as regular newsletters (at least 2 in a calendar year), blogs, journals, and other publications by full exploration of social media networks.



2.4 To support international seminars of theoretical, methodological, or substantive importance and international training seminars to add to the skills of research in the field.

#### ARTICLE 3. Membership

- 3. Members shall be either regular members or affiliated members.
- 3.1 Regular members shall be individuals in good standing within the ISA.
- 3.2 Affiliated members shall be individuals or institutions interested in the activities of WG01, who are not members of the ISA.
- 3.3 All regular and Affiliated members of WG 01 shall be entitled to vote in the discussions about organizational matters at the General Meetings according to the principle "one member, one vote", which means that one institution also has one vote.
- 3.4 ONLY regular and Affiliated members of WG 01 shall be entitled to:
- 3.4.1 Participate in the scientific activities of WG01.
- 3.4.2 Receive/access free of charge the Newsletter/website/blog maintained by WG 01.
- 3.5. All regular and Affiliated members of WG 01 shall be obliged to:
- 3.5.1 Uphold the present Statutes of WG 01 and adhere to the stipulations of the present Statutes.
- 3.5.2 Conscientiously fulfil the tasks entrusted to them by the General Meeting or other bodies of WG 01
- 3.5.3 Pay their fees for the respective period of 4 years. The fees shall be fixed by the WG Board.

#### ARTICLE 4. OFFICERS

- 4.1 Officers of the Working Group shall be elected once every four years in the Business Meeting of every World Congress of Sociology, as stipulated in Article 5.
- 4.2 The composition of the Board shall be:
- i) President: represents the WG both internally and externally and shall have general responsibility for the coordination and communication. S/he shall chair the meetings of the Executive Board; in his/her absence, the meeting will be chaired by the Vice-President or another nominated Board member.
- *ii)* Vice-Presidents (two): supports internal and external representation coordination and communication, and represents the WG in the absence of the President.
- iii) Secretary: (by election)
- iv) Treasurer: finance, subscriptions, and membership data.
- v) Online Communication Manager
- vi) At least four other members, at least one from three continents.
- vii) Ex-officio Former President (only the last one).
- 4.3 The term of the office shall be four years.
- *i)* The president can serve a maximum of 2 terms.
- ii) Officers: Two Vice-Presidents (by election), 1 Secretary (by election), and 1 Treasurer (to be nominated by the President among the elected Board Members) can serve not more than 2 consecutive terms.
- iii)Board Members: no restriction



On completion of two consecutive terms, the President cannot contest an election for the same position. However, there will be no restriction on contesting an election for other positions. If elected, S/he will not be an ex-officio member automatically.

iv) In case of open positions or temporary vacancies, the position will be filled by the decision of the President in consultation with Board Members (simple majority).

#### Article 5. Elections

- 5.1 To ensure the participation of all members, nominations shall be made by email. The Secretary shall prepare a form to be sent to all members at least two months in advance of the election day, together with a list of all regular members of WG01.
- 5.2 Nominated candidate shall be a regular member in good standing of ISA and WG01. The nomination must be proposed by at least one regular member and seconded by another regular member of WG01 by a separate email of this effect.
- 5.3 Nomination shall be sent to the election officer (EO) appointed by the Board for this purpose at least six months in advance of the month of the meeting of the World Congress in the year of the completion of the term of the Board (i.e., normally in January). The election officer will be a former Board Member or office bearer of the WG01 who is not contesting for any position.
- 5.4 Nominations can be sent to EO one hour before the commencement of the business meeting of the WG at WCOS. The nominations can also be collected on the floor during the business meeting at the WG at WCOS, supported by two regular members.
- 5.5 All regular members and affiliated members shall be eligible to vote in elections.
- 5.5 Nomination submitted through email may be withdrawn by the candidate by informing the EO one hour before the commencement of the business meeting at WCOS.
- 5.6 Elections shall be conducted by EO in Business Meeting at WCOS
- 5.3 The proceedings of the elections will be prepared by the EO and shall be submitted to the Secretary after the election.
- 5.5 The candidate receiving the highest number of votes cast will be deemed elected to each office.

#### Article 6. Business Meeting

- 6.1 A Business Meeting is held at the time of the Forum and WCOS in person only. The meeting is chaired by the President. or by the Vice-President of WG01. Votes can only be cast by regular and affiliated WG01 members in good standing who are present at the Meeting.
- 6.2 The role of the Business Meeting is (i) to receive relevant reports from WG01; (ii) to conduct elections for different positions (at WCOS); (iii) to make changes in statutes from time to time when this is needed; and (iv) to discuss any other matters decided by the Board and/or the President important for the WG. Decisions in a Business Meeting are taken by the simple majority.

#### ARTICLE 7. CHANGES AND AMENDMENTS TO STATUTES

7.1 Any proposal for changes or amendments to the Statutes may be made by any member of the Board or by at least five members in good standing of WG01.



7.2 The proposal can be circulated among all WG01 members by email. The suggestions from members shall be invited within 15 days from the date of circulation of the draft. The final draft will be prepared incorporating relevant suggestions by the person appointed for this purpose by the President. The draft has to first be approved by the Board in its meeting at the Forum/WCOS. Finally, the statutes will be adopted by the WG in the Business Meeting by a simple majority. All changes and amendments must follow the principles of the ISA policy and guidelines.

#### ARTICLE 8. RELATIONS WITH OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

Relations with other organizations may be established by the WG01 or by the Board as is deemed useful or necessary, following the aims and objectives of WG01 and ISA policy.

Article 9. Membership Fee

Dues are \$40 (\$20 discount) for 4 years. To become a member, follow the ISA procedure according to the ISA Membership Guidelines.

Article 10. Responsibilities of Members

In addition to paying dues, all members are responsible for the activities of the Group, including convening meetings, publications, contributions to the Newsletter (Web Page), and other undertakings of the Group.

The geopolitics is a multidimensional concept. The fundamentals of geopolitics begin with the unique imperatives and constraints of nation-states. They involve looking at all the attributes that affect a country or a region and dissecting each piece to better understand its implications. The overall geopolitical picture of a country depends on the patterns of interaction and integration of elements like geography, politics, economics, military, technology, and culture. The term geopolitics refers to two types of conflicts: external or international geopolitics (generally diplomatic or armed conflicts between two or more states, usually concerning maritime or land borders) and state's internal geopolitics (a number of conflicts, civil wars, guerrillas, and political, ethnic and religious battles occurring within a state). Both external and internal conflicts have some common aspects that are closely related and are characterized by a high level of violence and media coverage. The global media coverage of these geopolitical conflicts is not as systematic as often thought. Sometimes, non-violent international crises and conflicts also occur as in the case of the Belgian crises (2011-12) or the break-up of Czechoslovakia in 1992 have wide media coverage at the global level at times. Even the deadly conflicts do not get wide media coverage. Thus, the relationship between violence, high media coverage, and geopolitics is not absolute. The local geopolitical conflicts usually 'make use of their network of influence, and generally non-violent demonstrations, or they restore to justice'. They clash during 'public debates, electoral campaigns or press campaigns and discrete negotiation',



The forces of globalization have created a global media system connecting every corner of the planet. The new communication technologies facilitated multiple digital platforms for communication. The innovations of smartphones/tablets/i- pad empowered the common man to interact at the local, regional, and global levels. Thus, media coverage of internal and external conflict is not restricted but is open and wide. The distinction between mainstream media (mainly national and international television, newspapers, websites, etc.) and social media (different social networking sites and applications and YouTube channels) is important in this context. While the mainstream media engages its audience through debates and repetition of programs at different time slots, social media focuses on an indepth analysis of the events and issues. Thus, a number of parallel media narratives are created to influence the masses on both the internal and external issues that influence the social, economic, political, and cultural processes at local, regional, and global levels. The nation-states that lost their influence and power in the initial phase of globalization are trying to recapitulate it either through changes in their national and international policies or through external geopolitical conflicts involving their allies in wars and military interventions. The interim conference is aimed to deliberate on these issues in detail. The subthemes of the conference are as follows:

- i. Geopolitics: concept, approaches and attributes;
- ii. Geopolitics: External, internal, and local conflicts
- iii. Geopolitics and Urban Governance
- iv. Geopolitics and the Nation States
- v. Globalization and the Power of Nation States
- vi. Globalization and media narratives
- vii. Geopolitics and the patterns of media coverage in social media
- viii. Democratization, Modernity, and Territorial Variations
- ix. Globalization, Geopolitical Conflicts, and Modern Nation States: Continuity and Transformation;
- x. Global Communication System and Geopolitics
- xi. Geopolitics and the changing world order
- xii. Geopolitical analysis of community structure and Electoral Behaviour: Local dynamics
- xiii. Crisis of Modernity and Changing World Order
- xiv. Neo-Imperialism and the Nation States

The above sub-themes are only indicative. Other themes related to the main topic of the conference will also be considered.
