2. News from RC43 members

Bo Li participated in the 9th Joint International Academic Conference on Land Policy, held in Hangzhou, China, on 19 October.


He delivered a keynote address on Germany's rental housing system and welfare regime, highlighting potential lessons for China's housing policy development.

Bo Li also joined a roundtable discussion on "Optimizing Urban-Rural Development Patterns and Land System Reform" alongside leading scholars in the field.

Following the main conference, he presented ongoing quantitative research on fiscal structures and housing price resilience at Zhejiang University's School of Public Affairs.



Paul Watt presented at Université Sorbonne Nouvelle on 28 November 2025: "Housing and Inequalities or Housing Inequalities? Reflections on both sides of the Channel." The study day brings together scholars from both sides of the Channel to compare these dynamics across disciplines (policy, sociology, geography, urban studies). Greta Werner shared that the TASA Housing and Urban Sociology (HaUS) thematic group hosted a one-day conference, "Knowing the City – movements, epistemologies, and visions," on 9 October 2025.

This event aimed to explore ways of knowing the city and how these manifest in planning and the construction of the built environment.

Pedro Martins shared that the first session of the Housing4Z Cycle took place at ISCSP (University of Lisbon, Portugal) on 6 October, focusing on Housing, Welfare and Inequalities.

The event brought together researchers, academics and experts to discuss the main challenges shaping access to housing in Portugal, as well as possible future directions for policy and research.

During the conference, the research team presented and discussed the project's Final Report.

The programme also featured a keynote lecture by Richard Ronald (University of Amsterdam) on "Generation Z and the Emerging Infrastructures of Housing".

RC 43 Webinar Series – Fall/Winter 2026

as of 2026, we will start a Webinar Series on RC43-related topics. The speakers for the first half of the year have been selected. As soon as we have cleared up all the dates, we will notify you about the webinars. For the second half of the year, we are now inviting applications for presentations for Fall/Winter 2026 (1 slot in September, 1 slot in November). Exact dates and times will be determined with the successful applicants. We explicitly encourage Early Researchers to apply. Our webinars are scheduled for 60min (max. 30min presentation, followed by a moderated discussion). We ask presenters to circulate their slides and, when suitable, related written work, at least 2 weeks prior to the webinar. The application runs from now until February 15 th 2026.

- a title and abstract (300 Words max.) of your proposed presentation
- info on the nature of your presentation (PhD proposal, draft paper, draft chapter)
- published paper, published book chapter, published book,...)
- if already published, the publication itself
- a short bio of yours
- your preferred month (September or November) and a suggestion of a concrete date for presenting.

Please compile everything into 1 (!) PDF and email the PDF to isa-rc43@isa-sociology.org with the following title in the subject line of your email: "Proposal Webinar Series Fall/Winter 2026_First Name_Last Name".

We are looking forward to your proposals! We will notify applicants by the end of February.

Raquel Rolnik is Full Professor at the Faculty of Architecture and Urbanism of the University of São Paulo (FAUUSP) and Mayor of the Butantã Campus of USP. She holds a degree in Architecture and Urbanism from the University of São Paulo (1978), a Master's degree in Architecture and Urbanism from the University of São Paulo (1981), a Doctorate from the Graduate School of Arts and Science History Department – New York University (1995), a Habilitation (Livre Docência) from FAUUSP (2015), and a Full Professorship from FAUUSP (2017).

Since 1979, she has been a professor and researcher in the field of architecture and urbanism, currently coordinating the Public Space and Right to the City Laboratory – LabCidade at the FAUUSP. As urban planner, she was Director of Planning for the city of São Paulo and a consultant for Brazilian and Latin American cities in urban and housing policy. She also served as National Secretary for Urban Programs at the Ministry of Cities between 2003 and 2007 and as the UN Human Rights Council's International Rapporteur on the Right to Adequate Housing (2008-2014).
