### INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON POPULATION AND DEVELOPMENT: NAVIGATING CHALLENGES AND EXPLORING OPPORTUNITIES, NOVEMBER, 18-20, 2024, LUCKNOW

The 'International Conference on Population and Development: Navigating Challenges and Exploring Opportunities', hosted by Sri Jai Narain Misra Post Graduate College (JNM PG) in Lucknow, took place from November 18 – 20, 2024. Supported by the ICSSR, the IASP, the IHAT, the PSI India, the RC-41 of the International Sociological Association (ISA) and the Indian Sociological Society (ISS), the event brought together over 200 scholars, practitioners and policymakers from India and abroad, including participants from Finland, South Africa, Sri Lanka, France, Austria, the USA and India. The three-day conference aimed to foster scientific discussions and debates on population dynamics and development, particularly examining these issues through the lens of the Global North and Global South. It provided a valuable opportunity for the exchange of ideas, knowledge, and experiences, enabling attendees to address contemporary challenges and explore actionable opportunities in the field of population and development. As a lasting outcome of the conference, Professor Vinod Chandra is editing a book comprising a selection of fifteen papers presented in Lucknow.

## RESEARCH PROJECTS

### Research overview:

The research team of **Ural Federal University** (Russian Federation), led by Professor **Anna Bagirova**, is implementing a project to study a new phenomenon for Russia – the participation of business in solving demographic problems. The project "Corporate Citizenship as an institution supporting Russian Pro-natalist Politics: resources and mechanisms for development, transformation and scaling of practices, assessment and forecast of potential effects" was supported by the Russian Science Foundation for the period from 2024 to 2026 (grant No. 24-18-00854, <https://rscf.ru/project/24-18-00854> [in Russian]).

### Key activities:

In 2024, the research group (1) conducted a theoretical analysis of the aspects of attracting businesses to address issues of state demographic policy, (2) developed a conceptual model and research methodology for various categories of people interested in corporate demographic indicators, (3) conducted a survey of the working population of reproductive age and full-time students of the penultimate and final courses, (4) collected and analyzed the data reflected in the essays prepared by students on topics related to work and family, as well as data from the official pages of the state administration bodies of the constituent entities of the Russian Federation – members of the Ural, Siberian and North-Western Federal Districts. In 2025, the research team (5) conducted a qualitative and quantitative analysis of the data obtained as part of the 2024 research, (6) conducted a series of interviews with representatives of employers, employees and authorities, (7) conducted a survey of representatives of employers' and employees' associations.

#### AWARDS

Guillermina Jasso won the 2025 ISJR Lifetime Achievement Award given biennially by the International Society for Justice Research (ISJR) "to honor distinguished lifetime contributions to the scientific study of justice and for efforts to advance justice as a field of study." Jasso is the first sociologist to win the award. In July 2025 she delivered the Award Lecture at the ISJR biennial conference in Seattle, Washington. The title of the award lecture was "From Foundations of Justice Analysis to Current and Future Challenges."

#### NEW MEMBERS

**Shinichi Aizawa** is a professor of the sociology of education at Sophia University in Tokyo, Japan. His research bridges the fields of sociology of education, social stratification, and historical sociology, focusing on postwar and contemporary Japan. Professor Aizawa has led several national research projects on the transformation of upper secondary education and the historical formation of inequality and welfare systems. Recently, he has focused on how demographic decline and regional population change are reshaping upper secondary education in Japan, particularly regarding the public–private mix and patterns of school choice.

His research interests include the sociology of education, social stratification, and historical sociology. He studies how demographic decline, population aging, and regional disparities affect education systems, inequality, and public–private relations in Japan. He is also



interested in the long-term dynamics of poverty and welfare regimes based on reconstructed historical survey data. Methodologically, he uses quantitative historical analysis, regional panel data, and multilevel modelling to examine institutional change over time. He joined RC41 to engage more deeply with sociological approaches to education systems under conditions of rapid demographic change.
