I'm delighted to share a brief update along with Editors Daniel Muzio and Stefan Heusinkveld. 2026 has been exceptionally active with decisions on 188 submissions which is an increase from past years. Our reject rate remains at 45%, and we have a healthy pipeline which promises exciting articles lined up to be published in 2027.

JPO's Volume 13 brings fresh insights into some of the newest issues for professions researchers in 2026 (see below), reflecting the dramatic changes underway across professions and organizations: from elite careers and gendered trajectories, to generative AI in professional work, social media and the platform economy, hybrid professionalism and boundary work (of course!), and the politics and identity work inside professional service firms.

We owe a huge debt to our Editorial Board, authors, and especially our reviewers. Please keep drawing on JPO articles in your research and teaching, and please encourage colleagues (and students) to submit their best work.
