

The **Faculty of Arts, Department of Sociology** at the **University of Calgary** invites applications for a tenure-track **Assistant Professor** position specializing in **socio-legal studies**. Hosted in the Department of Sociology, the position is part of the Law and Society undergraduate program. The research speciality is open.We especially encourage applicants who employ perspectives of critical legal studies to analyzing the law or legal topics. The anticipated start date is **July 1, 2021.**

The Department of Sociology is a research-intensive department with high standards in teaching. We offer undergraduate, MA and PhD degrees in Sociology and an undergraduate degree in Law and Society. The Law and Society Program has over 600 undergraduate majors and offers 8 core courses in an interdisciplinary undergraduate degree. The successful candidate will establish and maintain an active research program in socio-legal studies or critical legal studies, teach undergraduate courses in the Law and Society program (and potentially in the Sociology graduate program), engage in graduate supervision in Sociology, participate in the affairs of the department and Faculty of Arts, and engage with the wider community.

The position requires a PhD in an area closely related to the interdisciplinary framework of the Law and Society program, which may include legal studies, history, sociology, political science, or law. All But Dissertation (ABD) applicants will be considered if the candidate is close to completion.

The candidate should also demonstrate a capacity for successfully securing research grants. Evidence of excellence in teaching should be demonstrated via a teaching dossier (see below). Applicants should also identify potential Law and Society courses that they could teach. Candidates who have experience in advancing projects with Indigenous communities are encouraged to apply.

All applications must be received by March 5, 2021

Interested individuals are encouraged to submit an application online via UCalgary Careers (careers.ucalgary.ca). Please be aware that the application process allows for only four attachments. Your four application attachments should be organized to contain the following (which may require you to merge documents):

- Letter of interest detailing why you meet the requirements of the position
- An up-to-date curriculum vitae
- A teaching dossier including evidence of teaching experience, a summary of the candidate's approach to student mentorship and graduate supervision, teaching evaluations if available, and two sample syllabi.

- **D** A statement of research interests
- a separate one-page statement identifying the applicant's contributions, or potential contributions, to equity, diversity, and inclusion (EDI) along with their ability to work with a culturally diverse and international student body
- 1 Two samples of scholarly work
- Names and contact information for three referees, along with the written permission of the applicant for the Chair of the Selection Committee to contact the referees for letters of reference which will be shared with the members of the hiring committee.
